CHAIR'S REPORT ON 2005

PERFORMANCES

- **Fallen Angels**, by Noël Coward, May. I directed and Rachael Orchard produced, assisted by Ruth Morgan. Excellent audience feedback on acting and set (thanks to Ruth for set dressing and Gary Arthur for design).
- **Mummers' play**: a team effort led and inspired by Ronald Stevenson, performed as part of *Kings and Liberties* (the Huntingdon 800 production), and also as part of the entertainment at the Mediaeval Banquet, and at the Peterborough Festival.
- **From Mafeking to the Millennium: Huntingdon and the World in the 20th century**, November. Compiled, directed and produced by Ann Monk and me. It was very good that several people from *Kings and Liberties* wanted to join the Club, and *M2M* had a cast of 16 – but unfortunately not the ticket sales to match, despite photographs in local newspapers. Positive feedback from audience.

VARIOUS

- Making people aware of the Club's existence: this was helped by members taking part in *Kings and Liberties* (including the performance for Princess Anne), and the SIMADS production of *Fiddler on the Roof*; helping front of house at PaTCH events at the Commemoration Hall; joining the Huntingdon Community Liaison Group; and building up contacts with the Town Council and others.
- **Commemoration Hall:** with the appointment of Lydia Eldridge as Artistic Director, and plans for a fuller programme of events, we're likely to benefit from the publicity.
- **Huntingdon Community Liaison Group:** this first met in February 2006, and should prove a useful way to publicise the Club to other local organisations and the press.

COMMITTEE

• My thanks to the other 7 committee members for their hard work, good ideas and good company during the year. It was a relief not to have any resignations.

PLANNED AND RECOMMENDED ACTIVITIES IN 2006

- **Silhouette**, a comedy whodunnit by Simon Brett, directed by Jacquie Spencer, produced by Rachael Orchard. March 9-11. It's essential for the Club's survival that plenty of tickets are sold. Efforts to build up audiences include:
 - o sending 10 tickets to Club members and asking them to sell them (this achieved audiences of 120 a night in 1988)
 - o selling tickets at the Tourist Information Centre
 - o selling tickets at the Commemoration Hall (an offer by Lydia Eldridge)
 - o having a non-paying audience at the dress rehearsal.
- *Move over Mrs Markham*, a farce by Ray Cooney and John Chapman, to be directed by me. November 9-11.
- **Making people aware of the Club's existence:** this should be a priority for the next Committee, for example through
 - \circ $\,$ contact with drama clubs and other organisations
 - o further improvements to publicity of productions
 - o getting more people to attend performances and social events.
- **PayPal:** information is available for the next committee to look into online booking and payment.
- **Personal licence:** the new committee should consider funding a member to get a personal licence for serving alcohol.

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
