A Note from the Director

My first performance in amateur drama was in Huntingdon Drama Club's production of Noël Coward's "Easy Virtue" in 1988 and I'm honoured to find myself, 21 years later, making my directorial debut for the club with this superb play by Alan Ayckbourn.

And how timely too, as Ayckbourn has been thrust into the limelight again this summer after collecting a prestigious Tony Award on Broadway for the Old Vic's revival of "The Norman Conquests". The Old Vic's artistic director Kevin Spacey described Ayckbourn's work as "part of the same canon as Beckett or Chekhov or Mamet" and the revival production's director Matthew Warchus likened his savage subject matter to that of Harold Pinter and Edward Albee, referring to him as the "Chekhov of our time."

As a cast and director we were determined to balance the comedy in this play with the underlying bleakness and despair felt by the characters as their relationships unravel during the course of one afternoon. The actors have worked incredibly hard to bring as much depth and truth as possible to this production and I salute them. I must also thank the crew and committee who have worked behind the scenes over the last three months to bring this show to the stage – thank you!

To you the audience - enjoy the show and thank you for continuing to support your local drama club.

Dean was in the Club's productions of *Easy Virtue* and *Pygmalion* in the late '80s, then left to take a three-year professional acting course at the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art (LAMDA). He recently returned to live in Huntingdon, and played one of the leads, John Malcolm, in *Separate Tables*. He says it's been a pleasure to work with the cast and production



team of *Absent Friends* – and what's more they say the same about him, which isn't always the case!

John Morgan (producer)



During his 23 years with the Club, John has usually been found behind the sound and lighting desk. But a part in *Picasso at the Lapin Agile* gave him a taste for acting, and he's since appeared several times – most recently in *Jane Eyre, Hay Fever* and as the retired classics master Mr Fowler in *Separate Tables*. He's also produced several plays, and this time is

doubling up as producer and front-of-house manager – which gives him the pleasure of making you feel welcome!

Dean Laccohee

Mark Lamberth (Paul)

Mark has appeared in several Club productions, starting with *Fallen Angels* in 2005. His roles include the obsessive Neville Smallwood in *Silhouette*, the happily married Richard in *Joking Apart*, film fanatic (and sex-on-legs) Seth Starkadder in *Cold Comfort Farm*, and the thoroughly decent Charles Tanner in *Separate Tables*. Paul's lack of warmth and humanity in *Absent Friends* is a far cry from the real Mark. This



is his last role with the Club before returning to his native Australia in September.

Scott Hutchison (Colin)



This production marks Scott's return to the stage after a nearly 20-year absence. *Absent Friends* is also Scott's first performance with the Club since joining at the start of the year. He served as prompter in the Club's last play, *Separate Tables*.

Warren Laccohee (John)

Aside from a spit and a cough in brother Dean's production of Macbeth in 1994, this is Warren's first proper acting role. No stranger to the stage though, Warren is also a talented musician, having played in the bands Fantastic Sam and Genus Fickle. He also makes up half of the popular local duo The Decanters, playing regularly at the Samuel Pepys, successfully combining his two favourite pastimes.

Carol Wadey (Diana)
